What a fantastic term we've had at RPS!

This term has been filled with achievements in learning; sports and we have a powerful sense of purpose in making everyday count.

Our term has been full of incredible learning in our classrooms and our Assembly this week showcased this in many ways. It was an amazing celebration of our students and a snapshot of their learning.

Our year-to-date attendance is 91.6 %. Keep supporting your child/children to attend school. We understand that children get sick and we don't want them here if they are unwell and contagious, so please keep getting medical certificates and present to the office.

As a collective of both new and experienced educators, we have worked extremely hard to implement the minimum schooling requirements for literacy. Our whole school reading data is holding steady, and we will continue to allocate our support to students at risk of reading. We need to remember that it is not a race and to sit and see what our results are for end of year. However, for now we are encouraged and celebrating.

We have quarantined the entire morning through to lunchtime for 3 to 4 days per week to prioritise high-quality literacy and numeracy instruction. We have adjusted eating and play times to enable students to move after periods of learning plus we have increased the break times during blocks so that students can have a brain break.

Events to look forward to in term 3 will be a Father's Day morning tea, National Science Week and Book Week, with plans well


underway for decorating classrooms. Further information will be given closer to the events.


